Welcome from the Chair







- **DELIVERED** an Ofsted 'Good' rating for our seafarer education services
- EXPANDED our IFAN work helping global seafarers to develop their career potential by offering access to the Maths@Sea, Writing@Sea, Maths@Sea+ and English@Sea applications, facilitating remote learning and reaching 16,831 seafarers
- DEVELOPED a learning programme for seafarers planning to come ashore, which is ready for funding. We recognise it can be a challenge for those who have always worked at sea to transition to an onshore environment and we want to support them through this process.
- PARTNERED with maritime academies around the world including in Nigeria, Ethiopia and the Philippines, contributing to a 150% increase in bookshop sales
- PLANNED to digitalise our marine bookshop, which will enable us to reach even more seafarers in years to come

WHAT WE DO

Bookshop promoting and supporting wellbeing and learning at sea

This year we developed partnerships with a number of marine academies around the world, ensuring seafarers have access to the resources they need to progress in their careers wherever they are in the world.

Indeed, we are becoming the bookseller of choice for the maritime sector. Supporting seafarers through their maritime studies and professional development with our extensive range of books – technical, regulatory, vocational, educational.

Marine Society bookshop

This year we developed a partnership with Philippine based Magsaysay Maritime Corporation to procure and deliver a 2,000-book student library for the new MOL Magsaysay Maritime Academy – a joint initiative between Japanese shipping giants Mitsui O.S.K. Lines, Ltd and Magsaysay, based in Cavite in the Philippines.

This year we sold more than **4,000** books

There were **387** separate titles – including **184** International Maritime Organisation titles

The bestselling title was 'IMO Ballast Water Management Convention'

There was a **150%** increase in the number of books sold through the bookshop

2,000 books were supplied to MOL Magsaysay Maritime Academy in the Philippines

85 books sold to the Maritime Academy of Nigeria

76 books sold to Babogaya Maritime and Logistics Academy in Ethiopia

37 books sold to the Ethiopia Maritime Institute





Marine Society is also pleased to supply the Shell Shipping Fleets 40 LNG (Liquefied Natural Gas) carriers with bestselling paperback libraries. Each ship receives 100 brand new books every four months. We're also proud of our continuing links with British Antarctic Survey Research ships, annually supplying a 200 book library to each. The RRS James Clark Ross and the RRS Ernest Shackleton support Britain's Antarctic and Arctic operations. In September/October of each year. Both vessels sail to Antarctica from the UK and return the following May/June for annual refit.



Crew libraries

This year, alongside continuing to develop our paperback non-return library service we have designed a digital online download service. Assisted by funding from the International Foundation for Aids to Navigation (IFAN) we have started to stock the digital library and will be piloting our first digital library with Shell UK before a wider launch in 2019. Through our crew library service we are committed to ensuring seafarers have access to quality books, because we know that as well as a popular leisure activity, research has acknowledged the role reading plays in crew welfare. From social engagement, to aiding relaxation, developing language skills and improving emotional well-being, reading can play an integral role in promoting on board safety and seafarer mental health.

Seafarer education – meeting the learning needs to today's seafarers


We were delighted this year to be awarded a 'Good' Ofsted rating for our education services, with a particular focus on GCSEs and A Levels, which currently form a key element of our offering.

Learn@Sea

We believe seafarers deserve access to life-enhancing education wherever they are in the world. We are beginning to meet this need through extensive digital marketing of our Learn@Sea platform offering practical Maths and English courses that can be studied anywhere at any time, engaging nearly 17,000 seafarers across the world. We are also working

with a number of marine maritime colleges in the pacific rim who have adopted our Learn@Sea programme as an accredited qualification for their students. With further funding secured from IFAN we have started work on the further development of the Learn@Sea courses, to include technical skills, such as ship stability, and to further expand engagement.

"Maths@Sea and Writing@Sea were very beneficial as it had been many years since doing any trigonometry, and from completing the course it's good to get up to speed before you start as you are expected to know the basics at least."

FINANCIAL SUPPORT:

The Slater Scholarship

The Slater Fund, managed by the Marine Society with Nautilus International, offers Slater Scholarships of up to £18,500, with an additional discretionary £1,500 for completing the programme. The Fund helps ratings study for a first certificate of competency, and can also help Electro Technical Officers and yacht crew gain STCW certification. This year we awarded 101 Slater Scholarships to Seafarers.

NATIONAL TEAM SUPPORT

Our staff are integral to the work we do, which is why we strive to support them as much as we can. Ensuring they have the right tools to carry out our vital work, can communicate across the whole charity and know they are valued is really important if we want to be the best we can be.

For employees we have

- DEVELOPED a staff intranet Compass – connecting the charity across all 19 sites and bringing together all essential information in one place. Plus, providing staff with a chance to see what colleagues do day-to-day
- COMMITTED to sharing ideas and creating new ways of working and championing our values
- INTRODUCED Asana, a group working forum enabling the communications team to streamline workloads, collaborate efficiently and improve our internal and external communications across the whole organisation
- REFRESHED our safety
 management system framework,
 and safeguarding policies to make
 them clearer, more accessible and
 effective
- LAUNCHED our first ever staff awards, celebrating those who have gone above and beyond for Sea Cadets
